Speaking of Volunteers - I would like to advise that Rueben Simpson is interested, and will likely be, your newest President of WANJ, starting next year. I have decided to step down after 8 years total as President, and my term will end after the end of the October meeting. I thought it best, as I think the Association needed a change, both in personnel and in direction. The daily pressure of my business also figured heavily in my decision.

I would like to thank all of you for your support and interest in keeping the group going, I do hope that the WANJ is able to evolve and grow as the world of Professional Watchmaking continues to evolve also. I can't say what the future of watchmaking will be like, but I know as long as we have watches, there will be a need for a place to exchange ideas and practice for their repair.

For the October Program, Dale Sutton has generously agreed to give another talk, on the history of E. Howard - Boston and the watches they made.
